## Welcome to TAGGS

The mission of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) is to enhance the health and well-being of Americans by providing for effective health and human services and by fostering sound, sustained advances in the sciences underlying medicine, public health, and social services. In support of its mission, HHS manages hundreds of programs which awards approximately over 75,000 grants annually. Tracking and accounting for HHS grant spending and providing high quality data to the public and external stakeholders is critical to fulfilling HHS' mission and strategic goals.

## The Annual Report

This annual report reflects a summary of grants HHS awarded during Fiscal Year 2014 (October 1, 2013, through September 30, 2014). Grants are a legal instrument reflecting the relationship between the United States Government and a State, local government, or other entity when "the principal purpose of the relationship is to transfer a thing of value to the State or local government or other recipient to carry out a public purpose of support or stimulation authorized by a law of the United States instead of acquiring (by purchase, lease, or barter) property or services for the direct benefit or use of the United States Government" (31 U.S.C. §6304).

This report does not include information related to technical assistance, which provides services instead of money; other assistance in the form of loans, loan guarantees, interest subsidies, or insurance premiums; direct payments of any kind to individuals; or contracts, which are required to be entered into and administered under procurement laws and regulations.

## Executive Summary

### Our Year

Improving transparency within federal programs and standardization of grants data were two major activities that impacted multiple business communities across the Federal Government in 2014. The Digital Accountability and Transparency Act of 2014 or the DATA Act was signed into law on May 9, 2014 and is designed to foster greater transparency of financial information through the use of government-wide financial data standards and publically available financial data. In August 2014, HHS established within the Office of the Assistant Secretary for Financial Resources (ASFR) the DATA Act Program Management Office (DATA Act PMO) to support implementation of the DATA Act with three primary objectives: to design a cohesive and coordinated strategy which leverages intellectual and financial resources and reduces the risk of duplicative efforts; to ensure engagement and support of Operating Divisions (OPDIVs) and Staff Divisions (STAFFDIVs) stakeholders; and, to position HHS to guide its own DATA Act future while serving as a leader in the government-wide arena. (The DATA Act PMO is organizationally located in the Office of Grants and Acquisition Policy and Accountability, within ASFR.)

HHS is committed to standardizing data elements for the federal grants life cycle, and in 2014, participated in several external and internal workgroups to establish a set of approved data elements that will have the same meaning across the grants administration lifecycle – from pre-award activities through to post award reporting, for use by all federal grant making agencies.

Now in its third year of production, the interactive Annual Report provides the public an open and transparent view of how HHS tracks and accounts for grant spending through the use of interactive maps and graphs. The online format allows greater accessibility of data to the public and provides viewers with tools to customize and display information, and download graphs and data digitally.

### Grant Highlights for FY 2014

- HHS awarded approximately 75,379 grants.
- 88% of HHS' grant funds were allocated to entitlement (block, closed-ended and open-ended) grants.
- Universities and colleges represented 34 of the top 50 HHS discretionary grant recipients.
- The six states receiving the most HHS grant funds were California, Florida, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania, and Texas.
- The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid (CMS) awarded over 77% of all HHS grant dollars.
- The National Institutes of Health (NIH) awarded nearly 66% of all HHS grants.

### Funding Highlights for CY 2014

**New HHS grants increase, improve learning opportunities for young children** - HHS' Administration for Children and Families (ACF) announced preliminary winners for its Early Head Start-Child Care Partnerships grants to improve the quality of existing child care programs and expand access to high-quality care for infants and toddlers. Thus far, 234 preliminarily selected grant applicants in 49 states, Washington D.C., Puerto Rico and the Northern Mariana Islands will receive over \$435 million in funding to help offer care and services to ensure that infants and toddlers have access to Early Head Start services in their communities.

**Grants to prevent chronic diseases** - The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) announced nearly \$212 million in grant awards to all 50 states and the District of Columbia, to support programs aimed at preventing chronic diseases such as heart disease, stroke and diabetes. Funded in part by the Affordable Care Act, the awards will strengthen state and local programs aimed at fighting these chronic diseases, which are the leading causes of death and disability in the United States, while helping to lower our nation's health care costs. A total of 193 awards are being made to states, cities, counties, tribes, tribal organizations, national and community organizations, with a special focus on populations hardest hit by chronic diseases.

**Grants to improve mental health services for young people** - Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) and Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) announced today \$99 million to train new mental health providers, help teachers and others recognize mental health issues in youth and connect them to help, and increase access to mental health services for young people. These funds were included in the President and Vice President's Now Is the Time plan to reduce gun violence by keeping guns out of dangerous hands, increasing access to mental health services, and making schools safer. The list of award winners can be found on HRSA's and SAMHSA's websites.

**HHS awards \$65 million in Healthy Start grants to reduce infant mortality** - Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) and Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services (SAMHSA) released \$65 million in grants to help 87 organizations in 33 states reduce high infant mortality rates and other health problems related to pregnancy and mothers' health. Healthy Start is targeted to the needs of vulnerable mothers and infants in areas of the country with disproportionately high rates of infant mortality. Twenty-two of these awardees serve rural communities, four will serve the United States-Mexico border, and three programs will serve a predominately Native American population. In addition, twenty-two organizations will be using these funds to create Healthy Start programs for the first time. The Healthy Start program is managed by HHS' Health Resources and Services Administration.

**HHS awards more than \$106 million to support state home visiting programs** - Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) and Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services (SAMHSA) and Administration for Children and Families (ACF) announced \$106.7 million in FY 2014 grant awards to 46 states, the District of Columbia, and five jurisdictions as part of the Maternal, Infant, and Early Childhood Home Visiting Program (Home Visiting Program) established by the Affordable Care Act. These funds will allow states to continue and expand voluntary, evidence-based home visiting services to women during pregnancy and to parents with young children up to age five. HRSA administers the Home Visiting Program in

partnership with the Administration for Children and Families to provide states with the resources they need to expand home visiting programs and early childhood systems.

**HHS grants bolster health care and public health disaster preparedness** - The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and the Assistant Secretary for Preparedness and Response (ASPR) has awarded more than \$840 million to continue improving emergency preparedness of state and local public health and health care systems. These systems are vital to protecting health and saving lives during a disaster. The grant funds are distributed through two federal preparedness programs – the Hospital Preparedness Program (HPP) and the Public Health Emergency Preparedness (PHEP) programs. These programs represent critical sources of funding and support for the nation’s health care and public health systems. The programs provide resources needed to ensure that local communities can respond effectively to infectious disease outbreaks, natural disasters, or chemical, biological, or radiological nuclear events. Administered by ASPR, HPP funding supports building sustainable community health care coalitions that collaborate on emergency planning and, during disasters share resources and partner to meet the health and medical needs of their community. Administered by CDC, PHEP funding is used to advance public health preparedness and response capabilities at the state and local level.

## Tracking Accountability in Government Grants System (TAGGS)

The Tracking Accountability in Government Grants System (TAGGS) is a robust reporting tool developed by the Department of Health and Human Services' (HHS) Office of Grants and Acquisition Policy and Accountability (OGAPA) in 1995. The TAGGS database is a central repository for grants awarded by the HHS Operating Divisions (OPDIVs), and the Office of the Secretary Staff Divisions (STAFFDIVs). In addition to award data that is submitted twice a week by the OPDIVs, TAGGS also receives recipients’ demographic information, payment data from the Payment Management System (PMS), and the grant program description information from the Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance (CFDA) website.

HHS remains committed to increasing transparency of Federal funds and showing the public where and how their money is spent. HHS staff, congressional offices, other executive agencies, potential and current grant recipients, and other interested parties access the TAGGS public website ([tags.hhs.gov](http://tags.hhs.gov)) for a variety of informational purposes. Commonly searched data fields include: Congressional District, program name, recipient name, recipient location, awarding OPDIV, transaction amount and fiscal year.

The annual report data reflects award transactions made during FY 2014, and may not exactly correspond to the HHS FY 2014 budget and accounting records based on the following assumptions:

1. Award data may include de-obligations of prior years in addition to current year funds;
2. Costs of personnel in lieu of cash are recorded as personnel costs in accounting records; and
3. Joint agency programs are only recorded if they originated at HHS.

The dollar amounts and percentages reflected in this report may also differ from the totals shown in each OPDIV’s Budget Request due to rounding and other minor adjustments.



### HHS 2014 Organization

HHS is comprised of Operating Divisions (OPDIVs) and Staff Divisions (STAFFDIVs), each with its own unique mission. The organization chart below presents the overall structure of HHS during FY 2014. The OPDIVs/STAFFDIVs are responsible for administering and managing approximately 506 grant programs which are described in the Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance (CFDA).

Note that in this report, Agency for Toxic Substances and Disease Registry awards are included in the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention grant funding data.

## Formula/Block & Entitlement, Discretionary Grants and Cooperative Agreements

In FY 2014 the Department of Health and Human Services administered more grant dollars than all other federal agencies combined. HHS awards formula/block, entitlement, discretionary grant awards and cooperative agreements. As of September 2014, HHS awarded approximately \$402 billion in grants for FY 2014. This included \$47 billion in discretionary awards and \$355 billion in formula/block and entitlement awards.

Discretionary grants are those that permit the federal government, according to specific authorizing legislation, to exercise judgment, or “discretion” in selecting the applicant/recipient organization, through a competitive grant process. Formula/block grants and entitlement programs are those that a federal agency is required by authorizing statute to award, if the recipient, usually a state, submits an acceptable state plan or application, and meets the eligibility and compliance requirements of the statutory and regulatory provisions of the grant program. Entitlement programs are not subject to annual appropriations.

Cooperative agreements are legal instruments of financial assistance between a Federal awarding agency or pass-through entity and a non-Federal entity that, consistent with 31 U.S.C. 6302-6305: (1) Is used to enter into a relationship the principal purpose of which is to transfer anything of value from the Federal awarding agency or pass-through entity to the non-Federal entity to carry out a public purpose authorized by a law of the United States (see 31 U.S.C. 6101(3)); and not to acquire property or services for the Federal Government or pass-through entity's direct benefit or use; (2) Is distinguished from a grant in that it provides for substantial involvement between the Federal awarding agency or pass-through entity and the non-Federal entity in carrying out the activity contemplated by the Federal award.

Medicaid, the Children’s Health Insurance Program (CHIP), and Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) are large HHS formula/block and entitlement programs, providing support for health care and human services to millions of Americans. Medicare, the nation’s largest health insurance program, is a direct payment program and its funding levels are not included in the TAGGS CMS grant totals. Examples of key CMS grant programs include the Medicare State Survey and Certification Group; CMS Research, Demonstrations and Evaluations; Medicare Hospital Insurance; and Medicare Supplementary Medical Insurance.

CMS, which administers the Medicare and Medicaid Programs, awarded 77% (\$310 billion) of the total HHS grants fund; however, these awards are less than 2% of the total number of grants awarded by HHS.

ACF had the second highest percentage of total HHS grant funds awarded at over 12%, or \$50 billion. This represented about 10% of the total number of grants awarded. NIH, which awarded about 5%, or \$22 billion, of the total HHS grant funds, accounted for 71% of the total number of HHS grants.

The following charts show HHS award history and the total grant awards and dollars for each OPDIV.

### HHS Award History

The Total Award Amounts and Award Number chart shows the number of awards in thousands and the amount of award dollars in billions that HHS granted during the current and previous 5 fiscal years. The number of awards is shown in the blue bars. The award dollars are represented as gold bars. Data for the current fiscal year, at the far right of the chart, are depicted in brighter colors.




## HHS Total Awards

The two pie charts on this page contrast OPDIVs that spent the largest amount of FY 2014 grant funds against those OPDIVs awarding the largest number of FY 2014 grant awards.

As illustrated in the Total Award Amounts pie chart, CMS far exceeded all other OPDIVs in terms of grant dollars spent. In contrast, the Total Number of Awards pie chart indicates that NIH had the lion's share of the number of grants awarded in FY 2014, followed by ACF and HRSA.


### Total Award Amounts

The Total Number of Awards pie chart compares the number of awards that each awarding agency made during the current fiscal year.






# Discretionary Award Types

Discretionary grants are those that permit the Federal Government, according to specific authorizing legislation, to exercise judgment, or “discretion” in selecting the applicant/recipient organization, through a competitive grant process.

Discretionary grants commonly support activities such as demonstration, research, training, service, and construction projects or programs. Discretionary grants are sometimes referred to by the CFDA term “Project Grants.”

Based on the HHS mission, grant program descriptions, and the CFDA guidelines, the TAGGS system uses 16 activity types to characterize the nature of the grant being funded. For the purpose of this report, these 16 have been grouped into four major activity types (Research, Services, Training, and Other). HHS OPDIVs self-select the activity type for awards based on the primary purpose of the grant.

The chart below shows the number of awards and award dollars that HHS agencies granted organized by the four Major Activity Types – Research, Services, Training, and Other. The chart contains rings, with summary data shown at the center.



## Top 5 Discretionary Grant Programs for Research, Services, Training, and Other Activities


Grants awards are classified by a 5-digit Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance (CFDA) program number and program name. These CFDA awards are organized into major activity types: Research, Services, Training, and Other Activities.

The bar charts below show the Top 5 CFDA awards for each major activity type. The number of awards in thousands is shown in the blue bars. The award dollars in billions are represented as gold bars, with the largest shown at the left of the chart. The CFDA number and program name are shown at the bottom of each set of bars.





"Other" programs include construction projects; grants for the planning and development of health programs and health resources; evaluations; and health infrastructure awards.







































### Organization

ACL works with states, tribes, community providers, universities, nonprofit organizations, businesses and families to help older adults and people with disabilities live in their homes and fully participate in their communities. ACL's programs work collaboratively to enhance access to health care and long-term services and supports, while also promoting inclusive community living policies, such as livable communities and competitive integrated employment for people with disabilities.

ACL was created in 2012, bringing together the Administration on Aging and the Administration on Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities. The agency is currently working on implementation of the 2014 Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act, which transferred the Assistive Technology Act programs, Independent Living programs, and the National Institute on Disability, Independent Living and Rehabilitation Research and from the Department of Education to ACL.

ACL's goals are as follows:

- Advocate to ensure the interests of people with disabilities, older adults, and their families are reflected in the design and implementation of public policies and programs.
- Protect and enhance the rights; and prevent the abuse, neglect, and exploitation of older adults and people with disabilities.
- Work with older adults and people with disabilities as they fully engage and participate in their communities, make informed decisions, and exercise self-determination and control about their independence, well-being, and health
- Enable people with disabilities and older adults to live in the community through the availability of and access to high-quality long-term services and supports, including supports for families and caregivers.
- Implement management and workforce practices that support the integrity and efficient operations of programs serving people with disabilities and older adults





The information helps healthcare decision makers, patients and clinicians, health system leaders, and policymakers make more informed decisions and improve the quality of healthcare services.

















**Organization** | CMS covers 100 million people through Medicare, Medicaid, the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP), and the Health Insurance Marketplace. But coverage isn't our only goal. To achieve a high quality health care system, we also aim for better care at lower costs and improved health.

Medicare, the nation's largest health insurance program, is a direct payment program and its funding levels are not included in the CMS grant totals. Grant programs which support the administration of some Medicare services are included in CMS totals. Examples of key CMS grant programs include the Medicare State Survey and Certification Group; CMS Research, Demonstrations and Evaluations; Medicare Hospital Insurance; and Medicare Supplementary Medical Insurance.

Medicaid provides healthcare to millions of low-income families with children, elderly, blind or disabled persons. It is the Department's largest grant program in terms of funding levels. The CHIP allows states to initiate and/or expand health insurance to uninsured, low-income children.

In addition to these programs CMS administers a number of quality-focused activities that benefit all Americans. CMS program objectives include:

- Building and Maintaining a Skilled, Committed, and Highly Motivated Workforce
- Accurate and Predictable Payments
- High-Value Health Care
- Confident, Informed Consumers
- Collaborative Partnerships

























## Mission

To raise the physical, mental, social, and spiritual health of American Indians and Alaska Natives to the highest level.

## Organization

The Indian Health Service (IHS) provides a comprehensive health services delivery system for American Indians and Alaska Natives with opportunity for maximum tribal involvement in developing and managing programs to meet their health needs. IHS serves a population of approximately 2.2 million American Indians and Alaska Natives.

The IHS goal is to ensure that comprehensive, culturally acceptable personal and public health services are available and accessible to American Indian and Alaska Native people. The foundation of IHS is to uphold the federal government's obligation to promote healthy American Indian and Alaska Native people, communities, and cultures and to honor and protect the inherent sovereign rights of Tribes.

The IHS manages Discretionary and "Compact" awards. Compacts are written agreements consistent with the federal government's trust responsibility, treaty obligations, and the government-to-government relationship between Indian Tribes and the United States and may only be amended by mutual agreement of the parties. Compacts are usually awarded with an "indefinite term" per the Indian Self-Determination and Education Assistance Act under Title V of the statute and therefore intended to be in place in perpetuity. Funding Agreements associated with Title V compacts identify the Programs, Functions, Services, and Activities (PFSAs) or portions thereof that will be assumed by a Tribe or tribal organization and the funding that is related to those PFSAs. Each Tribe has a sole right to its share of IHS PFSAs. Each Tribe chooses whether to receive the funding and each Tribe controls the timing of the funding agreement and the retention of the ongoing responsibility for so long as permitted by federal law or until terminated by mutual written agreement, retrocession, or resumption.























**Organization**

The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) is the agency within the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services that leads public health efforts to advance the behavioral health of the nation. SAMHSA's mission is to reduce the impact of substance abuse and mental illness on America's communities.

Prevention, treatment, and recovery support services for behavioral health are important parts of the health service systems for the community. The services work to improve our health and minimize costs to individuals, families, businesses, and governments. However, people suffering from either substance use and mental disorders, or both, because of their illness are often excluded from the current health care system and instead have to rely on "public safety net" programs. Last year alone, approximately 20 million people in need of substance abuse treatment did not receive it. Further, an estimated 10.6 million people reported an unmet need for mental health care. The gap in service to this population unnecessarily jeopardizes the health and wellness of people and causes a ripple effect in costs to American communities.

SAMHSA provides leadership and devotes its resources, including programs, policies, information and data, contracts and grants, to help the United States act on the knowledge that:

- Behavioral Health is essential for overall wellbeing
- Prevention works
- Treatment is effective
- People recover from mental and substance use disorders




