

Welcome to TAGGS

The Mission of the U.S. Department of Health & Human Services is to enhance the health and well-being of Americans...

The mission of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) is to enhance the health and well-being of Americans by providing for effective health and human services and by fostering sound, sustained advances in the sciences underlying medicine, public health, and social services. In support of its mission, HHS manages hundreds of programs which awarded 101,398 grants in fiscal year 2018. Tracking and accounting for HHS grant spending and providing high quality data to the public and external stakeholders is critical to fulfilling HHS's mission and strategic goals.



- ✓ HHS awarded 101,398 grants to over 12,000 recipients.
- ✓ HHS awarded approximately \$516 billion in grants.
- ✓ The 6 states receiving the most HHS grant funds were California, New York, Texas, Pennsylvania, Ohio, and Florida.
- ✓ The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid (CMS) awarded over 79% of all HHS grant dollars.
- ✓ The National Institutes of Health (NIH) awarded about 68% of all HHS awards.
- ✓ HHS awarded \$459 billion, or 89% of the total grant award dollars, to entitlement (or non-discretionary) grants.
- ✓ Of the \$57 billion in discretionary grants, HHS agencies awarded \$836 million to 99 international recipients.
- ✓ Universities and colleges represent 36 of the top 50 HHS discretionary grant recipients.

The Annual Report

This annual report reflects a summary of grants HHS awarded during Fiscal Year 2018 (October 1, 2016, through September 30, 2018). Grants are a legal instrument reflecting the relationship between the United States Government and a State, local government, or other entity when “the principal purpose of the relationship is to transfer a thing of value to the State or local government or other recipient to carry out a public purpose of support or stimulation authorized by a law of the United States instead of acquiring (by purchase, lease, or barter) property or services for the direct benefit or use of the United States Government” (31 U.S.C. §6304).

This report does not include information related to technical assistance, which provides services instead of money; or contracts, which are required to be entered into and administered under procurement laws and regulations.

The public can view how HHS tracks and accounts for grant spending by visiting the Annual Reports section on the Tracking Accountability In Government Grants System (TAGGS) Website (taggs.hhs.gov/AnnualReport). Users can download the PDF report, or view it online for a fully visual and interactive experience. Both formats provide an open and transparent view of HHS’s grants portfolio: the PDF summarizes grant data at a high level displaying tables and charts for quick viewing; while the on-line report enhances the users experience by providing interactive maps and graphs that make it easy for visitors to explore award data in multiple views and provides tools to customize and display information, as well as download graphs and data.



Executive Summary

During FY18, as the largest federal grant-making agency, HHS served as a leader within the federal financial assistance community and as an integral partner to OMB in the multiple government-wide efforts to continue building on the work of the Digital Accountability and Transparency Act (DATA Act) and to improve the business of grants for all stakeholders. One such effort was an OMB-led, government-wide grants management data standardization working group tasked to develop a standardized set of data elements and associated definitions for incorporation into the respective policies, business processes, and associated systems of the federal financial assistance community. This effort was often referred to as the Financial Integrated Business Framework (FIBF) and is part of the Cross-Agency Priority (CAP) Goal 8 within the President's Management Agenda.

Additionally, HHS initiated an internal grants initiative entitled Reinvent Grants Management as part of the broader set of Reimagine HHS activities. This initiative is geared towards a single user experience for grant recipients, reducing burden in grants management functions, and enhancing performance measurement.


Throughout FY18, DATA Act compliance continued to evolve and remain a priority for government-wide data standards that can be shared by the multiple communities and increase the availability, accuracy, and usefulness of Federal spending information. The implementation of the use of Activity Address Codes (AAC) for the HHS financial assistance community as of October 1, 2018 will report the new data elements for Funding Agency Code, Funding Sub-Tier Agency Code, Funding Office Code, Awarding Agency Code, Awarding Sub-Tier Agency Code, and Awarding Office Code for new financial assistance awards. This reporting requirement aligned the Procurement and Financial Assistance communities in the use and reporting of these Federal Hierarchy data elements.

Additionally, HHS leveraged its ongoing efforts to transform the Department's grants closeout processes and address its backlog of grants needing to be closed, when it complied with and responded to the Grants Oversight and New Efficiency Act (GONE Act). The purpose of the GONE Act is to quantify each agency's open grants and cooperative agreements that need to be closed as well as the associated undisbursed balances, address the reasons for any awards remaining open, and to ultimately improve the timely closeout of Federal grant awards to improve accountability and oversight in grants management. HHS's workgroups put forth significant effort over the course of this fiscal year to insure the Department was well positioned to meet reporting requirements pertaining to the financial assistance community.

HHS 2018 Organization

HHS is comprised of OPDIVs and STAFFDIVs, each with its own unique mission. The organization chart below presents the overall structure of HHS during FY 2018. The OPDIVs/ STAFFDIVs were responsible for administering and managing 526 grant programs which are described in the Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance (CFDA).

Note that in this report, Agency for Toxic Substances and Disease Registry awards are included in the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention grant funding data.



HHS Awards Overview

In FY 2018, the Department of Health and Human Services administered more grant dollars than all other federal agencies combined. HHS awards formula/block, entitlement, discretionary grant awards and cooperative agreements. HHS awarded approximately \$516 billion in grants for FY 2018. This included \$57 billion in discretionary awards and \$459 billion in formula/block and entitlement awards.

CMS, which administers the Medicare and Medicaid Programs, awarded 79% or \$407 billion of the total HHS grants fund; however, these awards are less than 2% of the total number of grants awarded by HHS. ACF had the second highest percentage of total HHS grant funds awarded at over 11%, or \$56 billion. This represented about 8% of the total number of grants awarded. NIH, which awarded about 5%, or nearly \$27 billion, of the total HHS grant funds, accounted for 68% of the total number of HHS grants.

Discretionary Grants


Discretionary grants are those that permit the Federal Government, according to specific authorizing legislation, to exercise judgment, or “discretion” in selecting the applicant/recipient organization, through a competitive grant process.

Discretionary grants commonly support activities such as demonstration, research, training, service, and construction projects or programs. Discretionary grants are sometimes referred to by the CFDA term “Project Grants.” The CFDA provides a full listing of all Federal programs available to State and local governments (including the District of Columbia); federally-recognized Indian tribal governments; Territories (and possessions) of the United States; domestic public, quasi-public, and private profit and nonprofit organizations and institutions; specialized groups; and individuals.



Top 5 Discretionary Grant Programs by Major Activity Type


Grant awards are classified by a 5-digit CFDA number and name. These CFDA awards are organized into major activity types: Research, Services, Training, and Other Activities.













The Award History


The chart shows the number of awards and the amount of award dollars that HHS granted during the last 5 fiscal years*.

As HHS begins exploring different methodologies surrounding reporting award data, the total number of awards and award dollars issued might increase or decrease in future reports based on the methodology chosen.

Discretionary Award Types By Award Dollars

Based on the HHS mission, grant program descriptions, and the CFDA guidelines, the TAGGS system uses activity types to characterize the nature of the grant being funded. For the purpose of this report the activity types have been grouped into four major types (Research, Services, Training, and Other). HHS agencies self-select the activity type for awards based on the primary purpose of the grant.




HHS International Awards






Mission: It is SAMHSA's mission to reduce the impact of substance abuse and mental illness on America's communities.
